Executive summary

- **Turing Oral History Project**: Phase one essentially completed; the last interview is scheduled for fall 2020. Phase two is underway, which will add oral histories for Turing laureates since 2015 and earlier laureates whose oral history should be supplemented.
- **Turing Award website**: The Turing website is up-to-date. Approximately 15 entries have been augmented with short video highlights from oral history interviews ("snippets").
- ACM Key Award Winners: During the first phase of this 3-year project, 41 oral histories with ACM award winners (of 72 planned) have been captured.
- **Fellowship program**: Five History and Archiving Fellowships were awarded in 2020. We saw a substantial increase in the number of good proposals submitted for these fellowships. The committee is working to better document and publicize the accomplishments of projects with fellowship support over the years.
- **India Industry Leaders Video Project**: We have started a pilot program for collecting oral histories with key individuals in India.
- **SIG Heritage**: The committee is developing resources and support to assist SIGs and Committees as they develop their individual organization's history.
- **History Committee website**: The committee has launched an updated website using WordPress and the ACM theme. We continue the process of populating the website.
- Concerns:
 - Procedures with ACM for permanent archiving of written, audio, and video content, especially interviews.
 - Challenges related to support from ACM headquarters for the Committee's web-based projects.
 - Understanding the impact of COVID restrictions on both budget and projects.

Title 2020 Fellowships Awards for Research and Archiving

3.1 List projects that will be completed or terminated in the coming year.

The final interview scheduled as part of the Turing Award project should be completed in FY21.

3.2 List important changes or milestones in active projects during the coming year.

Turing Project

- Tom Haigh will continue to add video snippets, produced from the Turing video interviews, to the awardee profiles on the A.M. Turing Award website.
- David Jefferson and Roy Levin have copies of the full 4TB archive (including the materials from the former project leader, Mike Williams), which should eventually reside in archival storage managed by ACM.
- URGENT CONCERN: Getting the source materials into ACM hands and backup maintenance. Can the materials be preserved in the ACM Digital Library? David wants to transfer the full 4TB of data to maintained archival storage. The materials could also be archived at CBI, which has an agreement with ACM.
- Need to clarify the relationship between CBI and ACM.

ACM Key Awards Project

- By end of May 2020, 37 interviews had been conducted (out of 72 commissioned)
- The project is on schedule for this 3-year project, although none of the material has yet been turned in to Wayne Graves at ACM.
- Still missing interviews with awardees of the ACM/IEEE Eckert-Mauchly, ACM Lawler, ACM Thacker, ACM Policy, and ACM Prize awards.
- Statistics for the 37 interviews conducted to date:

SIG Heritage

- The SIG Heritage project is advancing through the planning stages. We are currently creating a white paper that will further sketch the initial content of our SIG Heritage website (which will be located at heritage.acm.org). It will provide tools and advice to support the work of SIG Historians. We also anticipate various ACM Committees will be able to benefit from this resource.
- Part of the work is to find exemplar projects that help illustrate different approaches to capturing a SIG's history.

• A goal is to create an active discussion community for SIG Historians, beginning with the participants at the May 2019 workshop.

India Industry Leaders Video Project

- This project has been set up to collect oral histories for three key figures in India's computing field. The Computer History Museum will archive the interviews, with copies at CBI, copyright ACM. The committee voted to approve \$2500 for the project. Additional funds to be contributed by the ACM India Council.
- Interview planning is underway for the three interviews. Besides the logistics of having an appropriate interviewer and schedule, work has included developing an appropriate list of questions and identifying the platform that works best in the Indian environment.

History Committee Fellowships

- The Fellowship Award process has been working smoothly, with discussions over the past two years taking place on-line. One goal for the committee is to clarify and revamp the criteria for fellowships
- The Fellowship History work is intended to improving the process of collecting results and statistics from past fellowships

- 3.4 Committee diversity:
 - Four of the six members who left the committee are older males, three from the US.
 - Only two replacements have been made, one a young female; both are from the US.
 - Seven out of 14 current members are female.
 - The geographic distribution includes two international members and representative geographical coverage from across the U.S.
 - The committee seeks more Asian and European representation.
 - Half of the members are academics, one works as a librarian in a university institute, and three direct museums or historical institutes; three have extended careers in industry.
 - The committee has strong SIGPLAN, SIGCSE, and SIGGRAPH connections.

4. <u>COMMENTS</u>

- The ACM Key Award Winners Video Series and the SIG Heritage projects are key Committee activities for the year.
- We are excited to partner with ACM India in piloting an Oral History Project highlighting computer industry pioneers.
- The new History Committee website will include an updated ACM-HC Blog where we can highlight History Committee activities.
- Some committee activities have been hampered by uneven support from ACM HQ. We recognize that moving headquarters and the COVID-19 shutdown contributed to this problem, but it was evident even before that. Most notable have been the delays in matters related to IT, especially those required to support video snippets on the Turing website.
- The committee is concerned about systematic, permanent archival of historical materials. The committee is actively encouraging and supporting various ACM groups (notably SIGs) that are trying to preserve their history. The lack of a well-defined, functioning process to store these materials is a key concern. We urge ACM management to give high priority to solving this problem in FY21.
